Dear Ed:-

I am very sorry to have missed seeing you on this trip especially as I am going back to South America in a few days and it is hardly possible that I will return for another six months. Mother showed me a letter the other day of yours relative to the money which the farm owes you. I think that she will be able to send you the amount out of the wheat crop which has just been sold, as soon as she receives a check. As you know, in the last year or so both of us have put up various amounts to help out the farm account and neither of us have charged the farm any interest on the money except in the one case where I had to borrow the money from a friend at 6% which I charged into the farm account. For that reason I would suggest that we call the interest account square. In other words that my "interest" offset yours.

Since the first of last February I have been sending Mother \$100.00 on the first of each month, most of which she has used in paying off the farm notes. To date I have turned over \$800.00 to her, of which \$591.95 has been used on farm indebtedness.
