If properly fed from the start there is said to be much  
money in them on maturity for beef - I But I cannot  
say that they will keep in as good condition on  
slim pasture, huckleberry swamps &c. as grade cat-  
tle - My Hogs are a cross between two well known  
breeds, the Chester White and Early Berkshire.

My stock of hogs are nothing remarkable in point of  
size but keep in good condition on but little feed.  
They have a blended likeness of the two breeds from which  
they came; the grain of the meat I may say, is  
much finer than that of the pure Chester (the most  
abominable of all hog meat for table use) the cross  
which I have got their good quality of meat from  
the Berkshire and their early keep from the Ches-  
ter. I think my stock will keep fat on one half  
that it will take to keep the Berkshire in  
a good racing condition. My pen of 22 hogs of  
age (leaving out 4 small ones) at 13 months old  
190 lbs. per head; owing to the rapidity with which  
they grow when put up in the pen; they would not  
take on fat as they would have done had they  
been 6 months older. I am a great admirer of fowling  
chickens and am now breeding up a large stock  
of them: they are great layers and besides making  
the best mother; they produce the finest chicken  
meat that can be brought upon the table. Thus  
Ends my Farm Report owing to the many subjects  
involved in it I was unable to go into detail as largely
