My dear Mother:-

Your letter was received the other day, and today being Sunday I have a fine chance to answer it. I looked in all of the places which you mentioned but have failed to find my laundry ticket, and I have not gotten up money enough to face the chipman without it.

Everything is going on smoothly at home under Aunt Sarah's management, and she seems perfectly contented to stay until you come back. I have been attempting to your better trade since you have been away and hope to have a fair little sum for you when you come home if the wash woman don't hit me for some money. The delivery after you went away, I had to drop that Brown out and get a pound of Mrs Turpin's account, but the last 2 deliveries I supplied them all with full amount.

I got my report Friday for the month of October and will enclose my numbers which are very very low, but I hope to do better next month if I don't die or get set back. I had a meeting in the High School Friday
