

DEPOSITION

Case of Ellen Nelson, No. 736803

On this 5th day of February, 1902, at
Baltimore City, county of _____
State of Maryland, before me, A. St. Davis, a
special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared
Mrs. Caroline Young, who, being by me first duly sworn to
answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this special
examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says: I am 62
years old past, occupation Laundress and my residence
& P.O. address No. 547 Moser Street, Baltimore, Md.
I have known Ellen Nelson all her life.
She is my sister, and I am much older
than she is. Her maiden name was
Ellen Turner, her father being named Enos
Turner. She was born in Somerset Co. Md.
near Oleo Post Office, and belonged to old Doctor
Henry Hyland up to the emancipation.
My father was named Alfred Robinson,
and after his death my mother married
Enos Turner - so that she, Ellen Nelson
is only my half sister.
After the death of Dr. Henry Hyland my
sister and I came to this City, and have
lived in this City ever since. Ellen
belonged to Dr. John T. King, or rather to
his wife who was a daughter of Dr.
Henry Hyland. I knew my sister
Ellen well and intimately from that time
on continuously to the present time.
After the Emancipation she came to
live with me. I was married and
had a home on Vine Street between
Stricker and Silmore Streets where she
lived with me up to the time of
her marriage to William H. Nelson.
She was married to Mr. Wm H. Nelson in
my house about three or four years after
