5th. Hiram Parker, Capt. Co. D. 29th U.S. C. I. Vol. certifies at the Headquarters of the Co. Carolina City, N.C. Aug. 23rd, 1865, that "this soldier was when I joined the Company apparently a stout and healthy man, and was able to perform all the duties of a soldier. I am informed by the Sergeant of the Company that the soldier's health was good up to the time named. The soldier served with his Company under me in an active campaign in the Army of the Potomac from May 4th 1864 to the latter part of July 1864. During this time he was afflicted with a severe fever on one finger, but he suffered it heroically, and it did not hinder him from doing his full share of duty as a soldier. In the latter part of July 1864 said soldier was afflicted with diarrhoea and dizziness in the head, and being unable to do duty was on the 19th day of August 1864 sent to hospital. After this he was never well, though he was with his Company part of the time, and did duty. Said soldier's habits were good, and in my opinion his disease was contracted in the line of duty as a soldier." "Sergeon reported he died of jaundice"
