Sir:-

In response to your call of the 8th, received the 11th instant (GMH.326-325,124), relative to the case of William H. Fisher, late of Co. D, 28th U. S. C. Infantry, Cert. No. 604,532, you are advised as follows:

Edward Wright, of Day, Maryland, states in his affidavit of November 20, 1865, that he is acquainted with William H. Fisher, who served in Co. D, 28th U. S. C. Infantry, and was discharged at Corpus Christi November 6, 1865; that said William H. Fisher, while in the line of duty at City Point, Virginia, on February 1, 1865, was taken sick with dumb ague, and that rheumatism followed; that he was also afflicted with scurvy at Corpus Christi, Texas, on August 10, 1865; affiant was present with the command, and an eye-witness to the above facts.

According to a report from the War Department, Edward Wright served in Co. I, 28th U. S. C. Infantry, as alleged. It is also stated in said report that the command on February 28, 1865, was near City Point, Virginia, and on September 30, 1865, at Corpus Christi, Texas.
