

This arrangement however would free hands of
the Force employed under my Order, with its other
duties and important duties, and therefore leave the
persons of the Convoy's departure from the Bahamas
entirely to the Shipping Interest, requesting that the
number of Convoy may be circumscribed to two, if
there are not absolutely necessary, and I have to say
that our Govt will communicate to me, at what time
it will be desirable that the Trade should sail, for
my guidance in giving the necessary directions, if there
be more than those mentioned would better suit.

His Lordships have also been pleased to
direct, respecting the conveyance of Spice to England,
that upon an assurance being received from the
of the Trade, that a quantity of Spice is there waiting for
conveyance to England, if the sum of One hundred thousand
Pounds is collected I should send a Frigate, and if Fifty
thousand a ship of the lower class, and thinking it
desirable that this service should be combined with
that of the Convoy, they have recommended that
as offering certain and greater protection than can be
otherwise afforded, as it is my intention to send a
Frigate with each Convoy if its magnitude requires
it.

The Vessel of War being up which I
may be ready will receive on board any Spice that
may be to forward the better.
