Sir

I have the honor to send your Excellency a copy
of a letter that I addressed to Lt. Col. Nicolle in which
I inform you of my learning that a number of slaves had
deserted from Grenada and were supposed to have
joined him. I would hope that the Lieut.
Colonel had not knowingly received any deserters
whatsoever from the subjects of his Catholic Majesty
but as they may have imposed upon him by calling
themselves Americans I have issued the orders
upon the presumption that there are some such people
among the Negroes which he has enlisted.
