The force upon the North America Station having been reduced in consequence of the ratification of the treaty of peace with America, below the number of Ships authorizing the continuance of a Captain of the fleet and as you are about to return to England, I cannot allow of your departure from hence without first expressing to you how much I feel obliged by the zeal and ability which you have displayed in your public situation while under my command and how much benefit I have derived from your council and assistance in the active service in which the fleet and Army have been engaged.
