<u>Date / Place</u>	<u>Abstract</u>
25 March 1814 ASIA at Bermuda transcribed	To <u>Capt. Pigot</u> HMS ORPHEUS - Take 2000 stand of arms and accoutrements plus 300000 ball cartridges and proceed with the <u>SHERBURN</u> to the Apalachicola River to supply the Creeks with arms, and then establish a blockade of the American Ports near the Mississippi - plus detailed instructions
27 May 1814 ASIA at Bermuda	To <u>R. Adam Cockburn</u> - Since marines have not arrived and many will go to Canada he anticipates receiving a force of only 1500 men. Discover the strength of enemy on Chesapeake & to south to permit most effective landings and to facilitate escape of Negroes. You can pay for information
25 March 1814 ASIA at Bermuda	To <u>Gov. Cameron</u> at Nassau re Creek Indian request for arms, he has seen ⁱⁿ American papers that 3000 mostly unarmed Creek ^{warriors} had been captured. He has sent <u>Capt Pigot</u> to send them 200 (sic) stand of arms and reports his giving his advice to <u>Pigot</u> on how to proceed to make contact, and also provide any info re situation of Indian Tribes to help divert attention from Canada.
28 March 1814 Bermuda	<u>Proclamation to Chiefs of Creek Nations</u> to be delivered with the arms. Very flowery language.
27 March 1814 Bermuda transcribed	To <u>Capt. Pigot</u> - ^{very} detailed list of information he wants re the strength and disposition of American forces and settlements upon the Mississippi with an eye toward the landing and attack at New Orleans.
19 June 1814 Bermuda transcribed	To <u>Gen. Maj. Gen. Horsford</u> (governor) asking him to send the 101 st Regt to Halifax to assist <u>Sherbrooke</u> in occupying certain islands (names erased) as the peace negotiations with America begin.
19 June 1814 Bermuda transcribed	To <u>H. Gen. Sherbrooke</u> informing him of plans to mount an expedition against the American islands.
19 June 1814 Bermuda transcribed	No addressee, probably <u>R. Adam Griffiths</u> at Halifax with extensive instructions on how to support the upcoming expedition and subsequent reassignment and refit of several vessels.
