Ships with 8 Months Stores unless some speedy Supplies arrive, the Original Order for supplying Ships from this Yard on its first establishment limited us two Months, but of late the Commander in Chief having approved demands for 8 Months the Ships have been completed for that time, Cordage from 1/2 Inch downward we shall particularly want for an immediate supply, and if you will be pleased to allow five or six Steady Men from the Squadron they could be kept continually employed with the Rope-maker in remanufacturing junk, into small Rope.

A demand will be made by the first Vessel going to Halifax for a partial Supply of Line of Batts Ships Cables & Sails.

Bermuda 25th January 1813

Sir I beg leave to acquaint you that the extreme boisterous weather, alone prevented the remainder of Provisions demanded for His Majesty's Ships by me being on board yesterday. They were burned out of Store, but it was found impossible to load the Boat or send them off. They were dispatched early this morning, but a Calm all the early part of the day prevented their getting alongside.

I beg to repeat that every exertion in my power has been, and will be used to comply with the Demands of the Ships as early as possible after the same are lodged, and that not a moment will be lost in procuring other Vessels for the purpose, whenever they can be obtained, and which opportunity will offer in a few days by the sale of Prize Vessels now in the harbour.
