

- Jamaica for American Prisoners, who it is said, and I believe, are in bad health.

The complaint is divided into two parts, general and particular; the latter is founded upon a supposition, that my letter of which a Copy marked B. is enclosed dated George Town the 29 of April 1813, address'd to Admiral Sir John B. Warren, or Officer Commanding His Majesty's Ships of War in Lynnhaven Bay, was the cause of the detention of the Anatootan. In my reply a Copy whereof marked C. is also herewith transmitted, I have expressed my conviction of the Propriety of not permitting the Cartel Anatootan to depart, until the remainder of the Seamen of His Majesty's Ships Victorious and Tartarus, and the other Prisoners at or near Profolk are delivered on board one of His Majesty's Ships in Lynnhaven Bay, or until satisfactory reasons are assign'd for not delivering them. I have at the same time denied that the detention of the Cartel is owing to my letter of the 29th April; and declared that it was Sir John Warren's Determination, independant of any suggestion from me, not to allow the Cartel to sail from the Chesapeake until the British Prisoners are delivered as above-mentioned.
