I have to lay before you the correspondence between Lieutenant Vansens P. Kennedy, commanding Ab States cutter Scorpion, under my command, the not immediately considered attached to the Gunboat -

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In the night of the 8th Current, at past 8 P.M. Captain Stewart sent by Lieut: Swift, commanding the Detachment of Marines here, a note to me saying, a Sloop of War & Gun Boat were in the Roads, that it would be well to throw all the force I could, to strengthen the boat on this Station; I immediately called Lieut: Walter G. Anderson, attached to this Yard, on board the Scorpion, finding her Commander & Lieutenant on shore; directed him to get under weigh, also Lt. 154 Young being, with what volunteers we could collect, with verbal orders to Lieut: Gardner in command of the Flotilla to take the men out of the Scorpion, and divide them among the boats, they being very weak, & drop the cutter Astor.
