

Denton, Nov 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1832,

Dear Sir,

Since writing to you, Jane  
Shap a young woman has made application to me  
for a passage to Liberia, I have agreed he she  
shall go — Some of the Emigrants are waiting  
for the time to come, to start; and are desirous of  
going to Baltimore immediately. I have been fearful  
they ~~would~~ met with some to dissuade them from  
going, and have prevailed upon them to re-  
main until you write for them —

In your letter to me you mentioned that  
Witholy White had made application to you in  
order to go to Liberia, but said nothing about  
his family, and when I wrote, I was under the  
impression, his family was not going, since it  
has occurred, <sup>from</sup> that if you had been of the opinion  
his family was going my letter was calculated to  
~~alter~~ that opinion. I have made enquiry  
and learn he has a wife and several  
children, and he wishes to take all with him.

I have continued my enquiries for James  
Wolfsona but have not found him. Perhaps  
it would be safe to set Caroline County  
down for 15 or 16 emigrants — I received a letter  
from W. W. Henry dated the 21<sup>st</sup>. He was then  
at Salisbury doing well in the cause. he will  
be here some time next week, I expect.
