As this will probably
be the earliest opportunity of sending a
letter to America I ~~longed~~ ~~to~~ ~~write~~
it to drop you a few lines. The New Scho-
oner has all her timbers up, and we will
soon put the bends on - and to be in bound
judging from the port she will be ready to
launch or be launched by the arrival of
the Expedition. I send you an order for
a few articles, which will be necessa-
ry (essentially so) for the vessel,

viz.
1 Flying Gib. 45 feet on the Leach 14 ft. on foot.
1 Square sail yard 28 ft. Long.
1 Square sail, 25 ft. hoist.
1 Top Sail. 13½ ft. hoist. from the Stanchion yard.
4 Bolts Light Canvas for top Gal. Sails & main
gaff. top sail.
500 lb. round iron (amv) & 500 lb. flat bars from
All the Materials for a pattern Windows
Keeps. the bar that goes through the neck
of the windows Mr. Russell will tell you the
meaning as he is the maker the Gentlemen from
whom you got the Spikes on Jello point. Just
say to him that the vessel for which these
things are wanted is 50 tons and he will know
the exact of the Windows.

Please send by the Expedition
Vessel (well secured) My Mach. Guddran
and Sea Compass. You will do me a
favor if you will see Mr. G. Draper and
ask him to send me a box of Lypticks.
