make sale; I think of 50 or 60 souls on board
of her, & it is a consolation to me to remember
that shipment of corn meal which she took
out for a Virginia merchant. It may possibly
have been sent, for wiser purposes than
he, or me supposed. In plain English, she had
plenty to eat on board. I hope to hear from
you soon, tho' you write for no other pur-
pose than to tell how Walter gets on, & that
you have heard nothing further from the
Liberia Packet. With much regard for
yourself, - for Miss Caroline, & not without
