Dr. James Hall,

Dear Sir,

I sent a small packet of letters by a Capt. Loyd, sailing from this place, a few days ago, to be left at your office to be sent to Cape Palmas. But as winds & weather are uncertain, & as by some mishap they may not reach their destination, I inclose one to you by mail, that one letter at least, if no more, may go out, from our place, to Cape Palmas, by this opportunity. The same mail, early in March, which brought me the Feb. No. of your Journal with me intelligence from the Packet, brought me 3 letters from Cape Palmas, which rendered it certain that all arrived safe. A few days after I received, by private conveyance 18 letters more, making 21 in all, which were directed to me, & to my care, from Liberia. My health has been much better this past Winter than for several Winters previous. I hope to be in Baltimore in all next month. We are all well. Favor me with a letter. With much regard, I remain,
