

Baltimore Aug. 27, 1850

My dear Sir,

I received your letter and regretted much to find that you were still laboring under such severe indisposition. I still hope however that the latter part of your visit will be attended with more prosperous circumstances, and that you will return to us greatly strengthened and renovated.

Give yourself no uneasiness whatever about the Journal. According to your request I have provided materials for it, and hope you will be pleased with my humble effort to supply at least in some small degree your "lack of service." I have today returned the proof sheet, corrected, to the Printer with a few lines to file up and tomorrow our little Monthly will be out, and I will mail for you one of the very first struck off.

August has been an unfruitful month. I have done little. The Camp Meeting failed me altogether, no opportunity being allowed me to operate in favor of Colonization. However I trust the ⁵⁹
