

Annville Oct 20<sup>th</sup> 1851

My dear Sir

I have the honor of your favor of July 14<sup>th</sup> by the "Liberian Packet". In regard to the Cotton seeds, you will have received before this time, my reply to you lettered by the Barge "Baltimore" notifying me that another lot had been sent to you which you would forward by the Packet. And Straw, the British Agent, declined receiving any more.

I regret the inadvertence, for I may so call it, of your Charleston Correspondent. Mr McBee, however, forwarded the lot by the Packet to Cape Palmas - which I understand was very acceptable to the people there.

I was very sorry to hear that you were quite sick, indeed, ill, when the Packet sailed. I guess you fatigued yourself too much in getting her off. Be careful of your health; if it is the will of Heaven we cannot spare you yet. I hope you have quite recovered, and that you are now enjoying the inestimable blessing of good health.

I send by the Packet a small box for B. Coates Esq. Will you please have it forwarded to him.
