Dear Sir Your letter containing the sad news of our Professor's death we received Saturday the 11th we heard in the morning but could not think it was true and went to you, in the afternoon we received your letter, it was not sudden for we could not expect him to live many years in the feeble state of health he was when he left America, the Boys seemed very much distressed at first but like all children they soon forgot it but if they live they will feel their loss it is a great loss to us for he was a very kind and much beloved friend, Anne and Alice has met with a greater loss than all of us, Mother sends her respects to you and wishes me to say to you that she would be very happy to see you and hopes you will come this fall as she would like to consult you with regard to the Boys there is no one here particularly interested in them and they feel that you are their friend, we should be very glad if you could make it convenient to come, I hope you will ~~write~~ write to the Boys and try to impress on their minds the importance of attending to their studies, Frank is a very good scholar but George does not love
