They believe, as is the case, that the prosperity of this Colony is interwoven with the Colonization Society and its effects on immigration; and they glory in no better cause than suiting all their acts and deeds to the principles of liberty now being accomplished through your labours for the ultimate civilizing and christianizing the benighted sons of Africa by means of persons of colour transplanted to these shores
