

Apr 27th 1852

Dear Brother I take my pen in hand this morning to inform you that I expect to send to Baltimore on Saturday next the 2nd of May three emigrants for Liberia, A Coloured woman whose name is Nancy Brown and her two children. they were set free by Jos G. Harrison in his last will and testament. I was appointed to settle the estate, he left all his servants to go to Liberia at certain ages and Nancy has arrived to the age specified in the will for his women to be free which is 25 years of age and to take with them all their children under 12 years of age, and his men is to be free at the age of 30 years. Nancy and her 2 children will take passage in the Schooner Palestine, Capt Perry on Saturday next for Baltimore which I suppose will reach that port about night if Providence favours them with a fair wind. I will place in the hands of Capt Perry, Nancy's free papers. I think it best to do so if she is permitted to keep them she might be persuaded to run off to Pennsylvania or some other free state and not go to Liberia. her husband says he will go with her to Liberia his name is Samuel Brown and sails in the Bepele with Capt Perry. you will please call on the Captain and get her papers and keep them till she is ready to embark for Liberia.

We are all tolerable well except Mr Plummer she have been a good deal indisposed all the winter and Spring. our little Boy Robert B. Plummer is quite a sprightly little fellow now. he still appears to recollect your sprinkling water on his head.
