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Cambridge February 14th 1852

Dear Sir

I recd your kind favor this day, and am happy to find that you have taken so much interest in my case. I think that you have some what mistaken my meaning though, I have determined to go out in May let the case be as it may. but at the same time I have not determined to go to Monrovia, and as for Basa I never thought once of going there. But as my relations are at Monrovia of course I am decidedly in favour of that place. But I thought if you could do any thing for me at Cape Palmas, interest would prompt me to go there. I did not expect for you to do any thing further than that, for me of course I did not know what was in your power to do for me there. I am happy to inform you that my wife talks somewhat more favorably about going out with me, and if she goes of course it will be all the better for all concerned. There is a young man here that is going out for the sake of his friends. If nothing happens I shall be on the ground in due time. but unless there is some inducement held out, of course it is natural for me to go where my friends and relations are.

I will send you a dozen copies of my Journal and as many more as you may want. let me hear from the Doctor again. Your obedient Servant
