Dear Sir:

As the object of my visit to this city is so well known to you, I deem it unnecessary to say anything in this communication on that head.

At the time of my leaving Cape Palmas, the Maryland Colony, independence was the theme of discussion, with a view to a future connection with the Republic of Liberia. The march was onward, and the labors of the industrious and enterprising, were being crowned with success and plenty. On visiting Monrovia and her dependencies, I found the government principle prevailing there. They have a growing trade which since their independence and new form of government, has been respected by the subjects of foreign powers;
