Dear Sir

I received a letter from you last fall stating that you could send for the negroes which I have to go to Liberia if I would pay the expence, I instantly wrote you, that I would very willingly pay the same that it would cost me to send them to Balto, & desired an early answer from you, but I have never heard from you yet, & I again write, I also stated to you that you might send for them, at very little expence, by telling your vessel, anchor off <sup>at</sup> Smiths Point light Boat as she come down, & you come ashore, in the little Boat, to <sup>the</sup> light house & Mr Pittit the keeper would show you where Mr Burgess (my Brother in law) lived & he would come with you up to my house which is only few miles from the light house, & we could put the negroes aboard without much trouble, if the weather was bad so you could not stop at the light Boat, you could come <sup>in</sup> the mouth of Coekarells Creek which is about 8 miles below the Q Boat, & any of the persons ashore would tell you where I lived,, let me hear from you immediately whether or not this arrangement I will suit you
