

for the present. We shall have another meeting tonight up the subject. But the probable coming of the Cora \$5,000 & one note for \$2,000 are  $\frac{16}{19}$  lost. — and nothing in the Treasury — & nothing coming in — all stare us in the face — and look daggers! — Again — the Cora is only 331 tons — will therefore carry only  $165\frac{1}{2}$  emigrants — we have 280 who ought to go — not including any from Manzanilla. Therefore the Cora will not do. —

Again — the Burnitiera houses can be made in 60 days — shall we postpone the sailing till 1 June — & send the houses? — Then — shall we send Mr. Seys to see to the putting <sup>up</sup> of these receptacles, one at Monrovia, & the other at Cape Mount — & then to get ready a house, or houses for the Experiment — all sure I settled before the Nov. vessel arrives! These are questions which demand & command our present attention. I hope you will not fail
