Mrs. Sharps 24, "For lodging \$50. 2. 0 —
For police \$45. 00 — & For keeping \$64. 38
\$165. 63" — The bills of the whole
Company amounted to upwards of \$500. 00
The owners & agents of some of them, stand
in jail with them! I think it will be
a long time before I send another vessel
from Savannah! — Perhaps we shall not
be allowed to send any more. The city Council
has since resolved that the sending of
emigrants from that port has been productive
of evils which ought not to be tolerated & have
appointed a Committee to report what shall
be done in the premises.

I have given you credit for the
balance left of Mrs. Sharps \$200. 00 — but
allow me to say — if under all the
circumstances the heavy expense shall be
gain of the ship to a third part on Lib^a —
You think we ought to have that balance — I
am sure we shall not have cause to complain!

Did you overlook my question — will the
Shilley go to Lib^a — or shall we send two or three boards by
the "Mendi?" — Who are all those you say came in
the Mendi? A hundred each for them would make
something? — Dr. Ed. is no better — Mr. G. is just about
with Mrs. G. who however I am happy to say is better — We all
