

The number that go ^{in or} from
this State, will depend very
much on whether Mr. Stevens
comes to Boston. I do not
believe anything is to be feared
from abolitionism in the case.
The only question of impor-
tance to be taken into the account,
in my judgment, is, will the
additional expense justify such
a lengthening out of the voyage?

I have written to Mr. McLain
on the subject, and shall ex-
pect a decided answer soon.

Please say just when our em-
igrants must be in Baltimore
to embark from that port; and
whether they can be put on
board at Hampton Roads from
the Baltimore steamer! -
