My dear Sir,

I write to you  
fully by the Ocean Eagle. This goes  
by the Mary Steele and perhaps  
may reach you first. We are quite  
well. Mr. Day is devoted to his School  
and has some days over 100 pupils. I  
hope and trust his health may  
last to carry on the work.

We have been lately  
visiting the Mountain town, and  
suddenly a remarkable Providence  
seem to have attended the  
commencement and continuance  
of this beautiful beautiful settle-  
ment. Carysberg is destined to  
be a large populous agricultural  
settlement.

They cannot get lumber  
as fast as they need it, and I  
recommend a "portable saw-  
mill". These are common in  
your Western country. They ac-  
complish wonders in Illinois.  
But I recommend the Native  
Power to be one of Erickson's  
handic engines and not steam.
