at Cape Cod where she sold all of her Flour, arrived here on the  
15 inst, bringing only 50 Bbls Mackinac and 100 Pilsener - the  
Mackinac sold at once at \$12.50 per Bbl, the lumber at \$30 & \$32.  
Provisions & Flour would sell well now, yet it is doubtful if  
any considerable advance would be made at present American  
prices. You will find several errors in the letter dated 5 inst  
not 5 pages however \$30.00 same page in addition of 1000 in the 1st page is an  
error in the copy out of 1000, and \$100.00 - also of them to be deleted  
off the last page from 25 (which was \$100.00 to be placed in  
credit it being three hundred - We have our sales copied by  
Frank, and carefully examined after him, the first five pages -  
also the remainder, three pages he pronounced correct, having satisfied  
himself in regard to the facts, we did not examine the remainder until  
it was necessary to copy into our sales books - You will find the  
corrections made in our next account, the difference to require  
into credit being \$12.50 per Bbl. We shall be in want of Wheat for the Brig "Palmer"  
and the fact that you may have got some way to get a  
part of our private order especially supplies for your use  
and Flour, Butter, Lard, Ham, Bacon, Pork, Mackinac, Sugar nearly  
in all consumed, will be entirely consumed by another month.  
We might send to England for a few articles, but funds are want-  
ing as we don't like to draw on you when you are pressed, and  
we cannot effect the shipment of our bills to England - The Brig  
by which we designed shipping, had a list of her anchors & stores  
to be repaired, causing a delay of a month or more
