

demand of the Liberian Government,
I shall make no objection to their
doing so, and shall be glad to have
the whole matter adjusted as soon
as possible. But in this case, they
should see to it, that our agents
in Liberia suffer no injury from
the part they have taken in this
business, if these agents have fol-
lowed the instructions of the Executive
Committee: and if in matters left
to their discretion they have not
intentionally done wrong. I speak
not thus from any suspicion
I entertain that they have erred,
but merely from knowing, that they
may have done so, even while in-
tending to act with the strictest integrity.
