From what I hear from Mr. McLain's last letter to me I am inclined to think the *Frederica* will not return to Liberia next fall with another load. If she does, please include in her invoice some men, women & children shoes and some 5 or 6 hundred dollars in greenbacks a thousand dollars in greenbacks will not be so much if she brings a full load of goods.
