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Monrovia July 14, 1860

My Dear Sir, The ship sails from this port today direct for Baltimore. She came direct from Cape Palmas last Saturday the 7th inst. She is in a healthy condition & the Captain on that acct hurries back to have time to put her in good order before her sailing day comes round.

She has in a pretty fair quantity of freight, consisting of P. Oil, Camwood & Liberia Syrup & Sugar.

Since I wrote you by the "Palmas" on the 2^d inst, there has been another death at Careyburg among the last company of emigrants of Nathl. Lindsey - You will doubtless have letters from D. Loring & J. F. Dennis to inform you of all matters of interest at the settlement, & of the present condition of the emigrants. I believe a large number are still sick.

The families of Silas Pope & Mary King proceeded on in the ship, as they desired to do.
