 to these stores, & again it appears he was in error about the
 boats. Strange that you & he should differ so. He is clear
 that you would the big boat & transport magazines & effects up
 the river, now you say a small one. Whether is at my
 elbow & I read him your letter & he says you can have one
of the small boats if necessary, but hoping you will take mea-
 sures for proper security of both, as the matter is great for me
 such item. Presuming you will fulfil your obligation for
 Mrs. Mills & husband's papers: Blankes & Cheston's papers are
 with you for till his convenience to settle them.

The papers of Sweet Mary Jane has been settled by Miss
 Deane. As to collecting papers on the coast I am
 sorry you feel that we on the coast have an unworkable
 business on you, but there are so many small flags, that
 even from every where & in every way, that to collect papers in
 advance is quite impracticable. The larger accounts for flags
 to posting in America the larger must collect himself.
 Look for all flags for the Ocean people & responsible
 parties in America & don't see how you could have to
 help him, by settling the flags in store & instructing your
 club to demand payment for flags on delivery.
