BOYS AND GIRLS AND AGRICULTURE

It is sometimes said that agriculture is a system of living rather than a vocation. This is true because of the intimate relation that there is between the home life and the actual producing activities on the farm. The farmer's home is an integral part of his industry; each member of his family sooner or later becomes involved and a part of the producing and marketing operations. From early morning till late at night, father, mother, boys and girls, with the hired man, are engaged with the doing of those things upon which the material well-being of the family depends. Unlike the ordinary business man who leaves his business in the city when he returns to his suburban home, or the industrial worker who devotes eight or nine hours a day to his trade or

vocation and leaves the shop, the factory or the store behind when he returns to his home, the farmer and the members of his family are intimately associated with and constantly confronted with work that must receive attention not only five and one-half or six days a week, but for seven. There is but little free time. The opportunities for relaxation and social intercourse are necessarily limited. What are likely to be some of the effects of this kind of life upon the farmers and the members of his family? The world of the agricultural group of citizens is likely to be narrowed, the vision of life may be limited, the social instincts are in danger of being neglected, and the thought is apt to become self-centered. There is danger that productive labor will come to be regarded as drudgery. The big outside world, with its varied interests and allurements, will seem to offer a

means of escape, and our boys and girls will look forward to the time when they can get away (and will do it), or they may become resigned and settle down to live a "hum-drum" existence. This may suggest a reason why so many good farms are being abandoned by young men and women. The remedy, if there is one, lies in giving boys and girls a viewpoint regarding agriculture. This can be done only thru education that fits for social as well as economic efficiency in an agricultural environment, with its possibilities and limitations. It requires an ordering of the life which must take into account the elements that constitute character and personality. The Junior Extension Service for boys and girls seeks to furnish that kind of an education. They learn thru instruction and demonstration, both of which set up concrete standards of

achievement in terms that the child can understand. They learn the simple principles of business practice and the value of constant effort and accuracy. Every project deals with the facts of life upon whose observance the well-being of the individual and family depend. It reaches out into life and can be made to affect conduct in an infinite number of ways. The club project seeks to educate thru self-activity. It recognizes the child as a social being, and thru his club activities fosters the social instincts and develops capacity for team work. The instant to acquire and own is strong in boys and girls. By educating them to produce and possess, lessons in thrift and economy are taught. The feeling of security thru the developing consciousness of economic independence is fostered, and the life of the individual and the family is thereby strengthened. As the indi-

dual becomes socially and economically efficient, leaderships developed, greater service is made possible, and the community which is recognized to be the fundamental civic unit becomes more capable of accepting and carrying responsibility and solving its own problems.

ORATORY CONTEST WON BY WESTERN MARYLAND

First Woman Enters List From Washington College.

Oswald B. Langrall, a student representing Western Maryland College, won first honor at the oratorical contest for Maryland colleges held at College Park Friday night, Mr. Lan-

grall's subject was "The Way Out." Second honor was won by R. M. Watkins, representing the University of Maryland. His subject was "They Shall Not Pass."

Other contestants entered were W. P. Maddox, representing St. John's College, Annapolis, and Miss Grace Nickerson, representing Washington College, Chestertown, Maryland. Mr. Maddox's subject was "Capitalism vs. Socialism," and Miss Nickerson's "Navalism or International Peace?" Miss Nickerson is the first woman to enter the contest since the organization of the Oratorical Association of Maryland Colleges 23 years ago.

The judges were United States Senator Joseph Irwin France, Dr. Carl Ruediger, of Washington, and Prof. Maurice Jarvis, of Washington.
