KILLED BY A ROCK HALL TRUCK

Davis Joiner, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Joiner, of Rock Hall, was standing on the street Sunday afternoon, when the big autotruck of Robert Shallcross came along. The boy attempted to grab the truck for a ride, but missed his hold and fell under the truck, the rear wheel passing over his stomach. He was taken to a Baltimore hospital that evening, and his condition is regarded as critical. News was received on Wednesday morning that the young man died the previous night. The deceased was 16 years of age.

FELL FROM WINDOW. TEACHER LIES ILL

Miss Lucy Murray, 1820 Park avenue, for 15 years history teacher at the Western High School, Baltimore, fell in the Maryland General Hospital in a serious condition from injuries to her shoulders and back received early Monday morning when she is said to have fallen from the third-story front window of her home to the pavement below. Persons living at the Park avenue address stated to the police that Miss Murray was suddenly attacked by asthma when she went to the window for air and fell out. Dr. Irving Ebaugh, 700 West North avenue, was called to attend Miss Murray after she is said to have fallen from the window and after a careful examination had her removed to the hospital. Mrs. Ebaugh, the wife of the physician, said that she was a close friend of Miss Murray and that recently the teacher had been complaining of great nervousness and she felt constantly as though a great weight was bearing down upon her. Her condition is thought to have resulted from overwork.

Miss Murray is well-known in Chestertown being the daughter of Rev. S. Reese Murray who was a former pastor here.

Boy Struck by Automobile.

Wm. Bryan Chilcutt, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Chilcutt, of Centerville, narrowly escaped being seriously hurt last Thursday morning, when he Ford car of H. W. Biddle, of Crumpton, crossed the street in front of the Centerville grammar school, and ran directly in front of the machine. Mr. Biddle was driving very slowly and was able to stop at once, and as a consequence, the child was only bruised and shaken up.

Interest amounting to more than \$1,000,000 will be payable May 15 to holders of Liberty Bonds of the Second issue brought through Maryland banks and trust companies. The total amount of bonds of this issue subscribed in this State was \$52,990,000 there being over 143,645 subscriptions. The per capita subscription was \$38.90. The four per cent, bonds of the First and Second Liberty Loans which were issued in temporary form have no coupons attached for interest payable after December 15, 1919, for the first loan and Nov. 15, 1919, for the second loan. Therefore, holders of these bonds are urged to present them to their local banks which will forward them to the Federal Bank of Richmond for conversion into permanent four and-quarter per cent, bonds with coupons attached covering interest from the above dates to the maturity of the bonds.

STATE POLICEMAN DROPPED

Officer M. Council, one of the original members of the State Police Force has been dismissed by Automobile Commissioner Baughman on charges of intoxication while on duty and conduct unbecoming an officer.

Council was charged with having acted in a disorderly manner before a police magistrate in Galena. Previously to this incident his record is said to have been an excellent one and he was accepted as one of the most efficient officers on the force.

Trucker Awarded \$1641.40.

Richard Lockwood, a tomato grower of Kent county, was awarded a verdict for \$1,641.40 against Arthur M. Hanahan, a Harford county canner, by a jury in the Circuit Court there Friday. The suit grew out of the sale of tomatoes last year. The amount in the verdict was admitted by the defendant as the sum he owed the plaintiff, and he declared that he had been ready and willing to pay it. In fact, the defendant's counsel, ex-Senator Thomas H. Robinson, asked the jury to render the verdict, which was based on 40 cents a bushel for tomatoes. The plaintiff claimed that by a verbal agreement he was to receive \$1.00 a bushel, and asked for a verdict for \$4,092.

HAND OF DEATH

Prof. William Zimmerman, a former teacher at Washington College, died at his home in Baltimore Tuesday aged 82. He is remembered here with pleasure for his many excellent qualities.

He married Miss Jennie Nelson Reed, of Winchester, Va. He was one of the first professors of Western Maryland College where he remained four years, he was then elected Vice President of Washington College, Chestertown, Md. Nine years later he had a recall to Western Maryland College to fill the chair of Natural Sciences of Language. He remained two years and was elected to the chair of Physics in the State Normal Agricultural College, Md. He retired 20 years ago from the schools and devoted his attention to Astronomy and Electrical Research, writing and lecturing for various institutions. He patented the first electric lighting and extinguishing lamp in the country, which led to the introduction of the present day electric lighting conveniences. As early as 1872 he had telephone and phonographs in his own home and laboratory of his own make, though he did not patent these. Later he patented the Illudoscope. Many of the conveniences of the present day found birth in Prof. Zimmerman's laboratory while he was at Washington College. He attributed his wonderful activity and health to his simple living, walking about 10 miles each day as a constitutional. He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. May Z. Timanus and Mrs. Blanche Z. Langley, both of Baltimore; two grandchildren, Dr. G. Lourell Timanus and LeRoy Langley; two great grandchildren, Hall Everett Timanus and Alice Lourell Timanus; two sons, Mrs. Mary Emma Zimmerman and Mrs. Dora Hooper.
