COUNTY HEALTH NOTES

Patients, old 27, new 4, discharged 2, died 1. Visits to patients 44, patients sent to hospital 1, infant welfare, old 8, new 3, discharged 0, died 0, visits to school children 10, school children examined 170, enlarged glands 12, enlarged tonsils 101, defective teeth 123, defective eyesight 66, Olitis Media 21, eye correctness since last examination 10, tonsils removed since last examination 5, visits to homes of school children 36, school children taken to hospital in Baltimore for removal of tonsils 2, eyes examined and glasses secured 2.

At Millington station the eyes of 13 children were examined at a school clinic with Dr. Power in charge assisted by nurse. A volunteer brought 4 more children from the same school for a like examination; 10 of these 17 children are to have glasses. The Red Cross is backing this piece of work financially.

May 17, 18 and 19 have been set for Child Welfare Conferences in different rural sections of the county.

Co-operative and social service visits 48, meetings attended 8.






