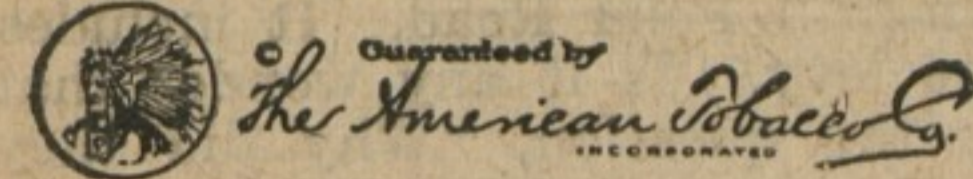

Milk, The Indispensable Food For Children.

One of the greatest needs that I find in all my travels through the county is the knowledge of the true value of cow's milk as a food for the human being, especially the growing child. There is too little milk kept on the farm for the growing child, and too much carried to the milk station to swell the milk check at the end of the month. The need for ready money is pressing just now, but in the meantime is the most important crop that the farmer grows to be neglected? Are you selling the food that the stock need in order to give the best results? Why sell the children's food? Farmers may be in debt, but look back and

see how much of that debt is due to buying food more expensive and less nutritious than the farm products. How much meat was bought in the past year for 30 and 40 cents a pound? This is an expensive food, and is not needed by the growing child. The farmer has at his hand the materials to make healthy children, but today he does not have as healthy a child as the city man. Extract from U. S. Children's Bureau Publication.

Clean milk fulfills all the requirements for an adequate food. It is nearer a perfect food than any other one article, in that it builds up and

repairs living tissues of the body, furnishes the required energy of the body, contains the mineral substances needed in the growth and functioning of the parts of the body, such as the skeleton, the brain and the blood. It contains vitamins in large quantities. This is a substance whose nature is not yet fully known, but whose presence in the diet has been demonstrated to affect body growth in animals and man. After the first year of life foods, other than milk should be given to furnish the so-called roughage, which is necessary to regulate the discharges from the digestive track. Then milk does not contain iron, which can be gotten in vegetables and fruits. It is the most easily digested food we have. The appetite must be consid-

ered, and for this reason, the child should have a variety. Milk may be given in cooked form, as soup, weak cocoa or flavored milk whey. There are hundreds of ways to use milk in cooking. All normal children are better for at least 1 1/2 pints of milk a day. The mother who does not furnish sufficient milk for her children and train them to drink it is not fulfilling her duty.

Report of the Kent County Public Health Nurse for the month of May: Patients—old 23, new 1, discharged 3, died 1. She told us the next time to have the top casing stitch finished. It was decided by the club that each one pay dues to the amount of two cents each. A motion was then made to adjourn. 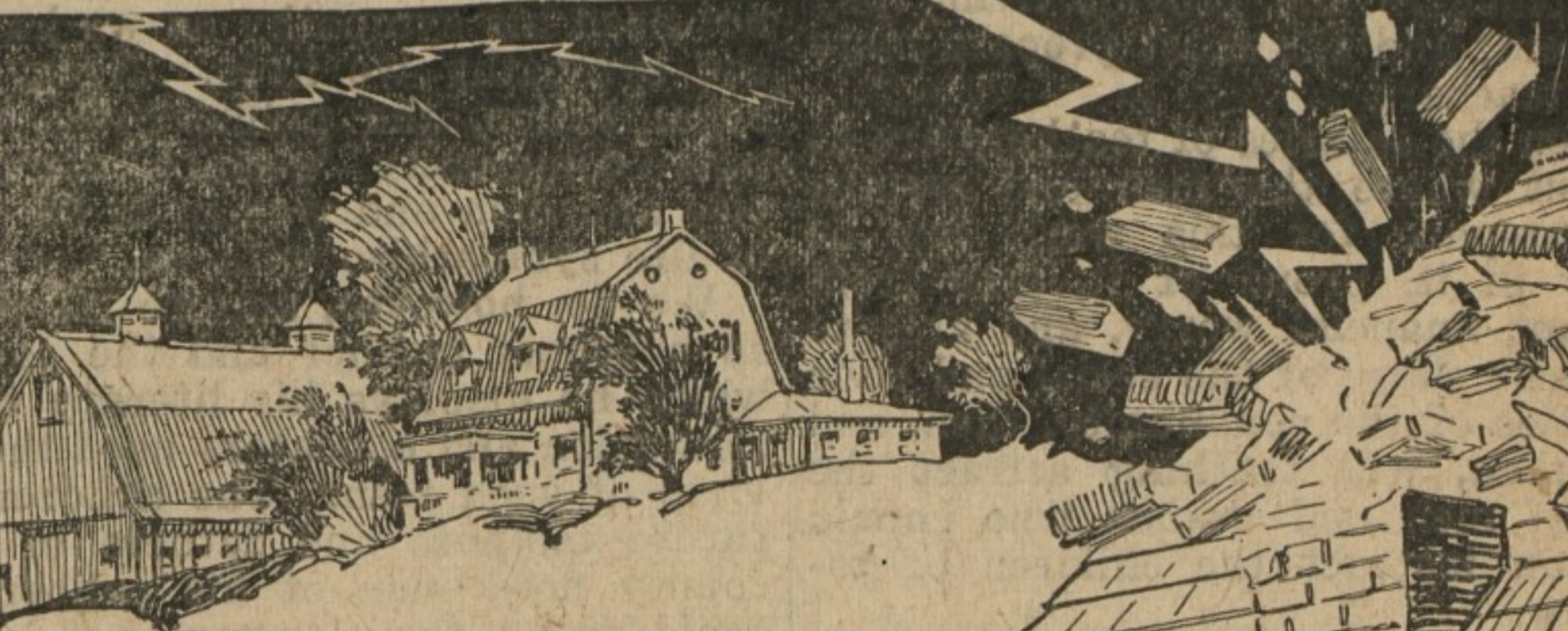

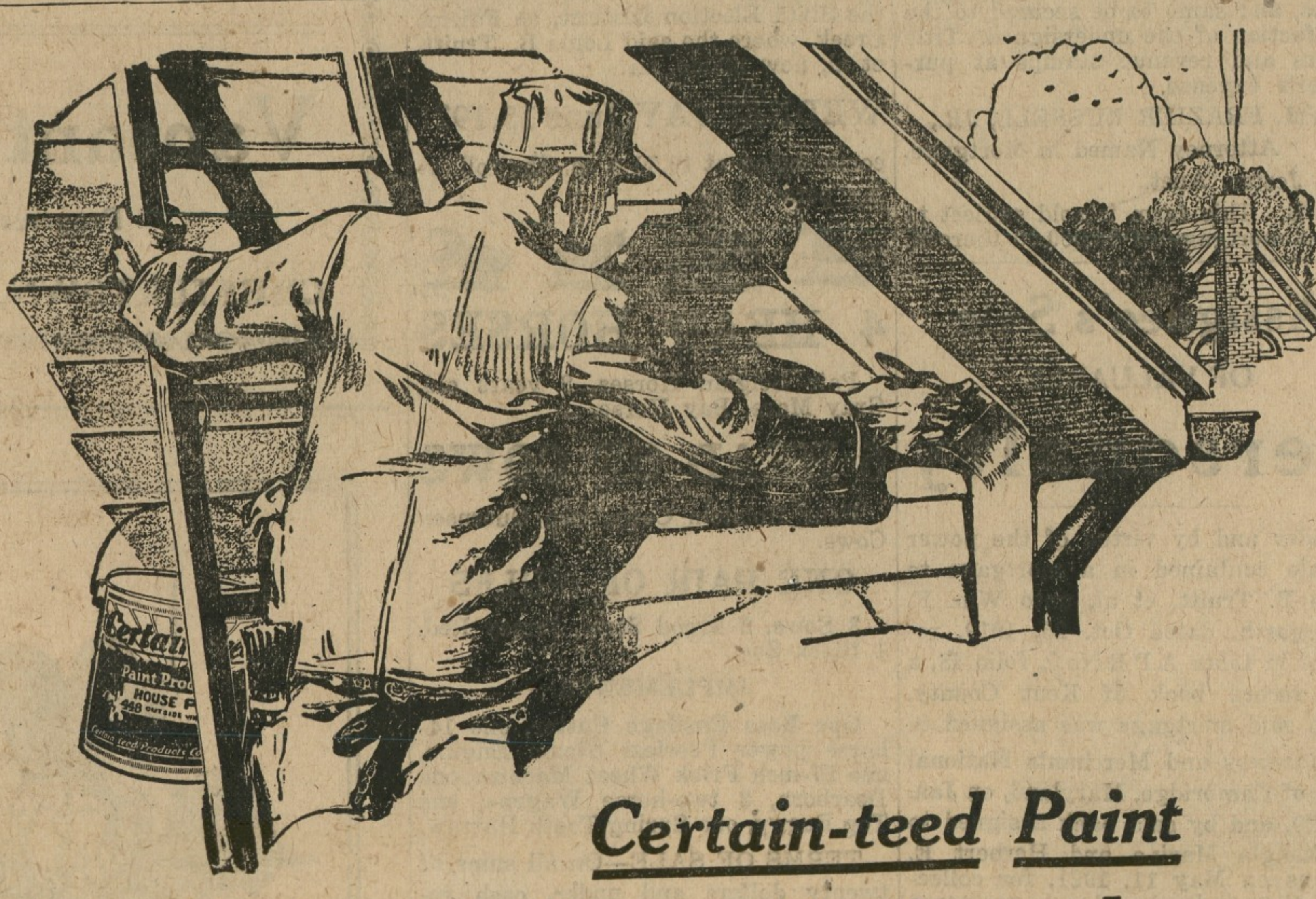
