

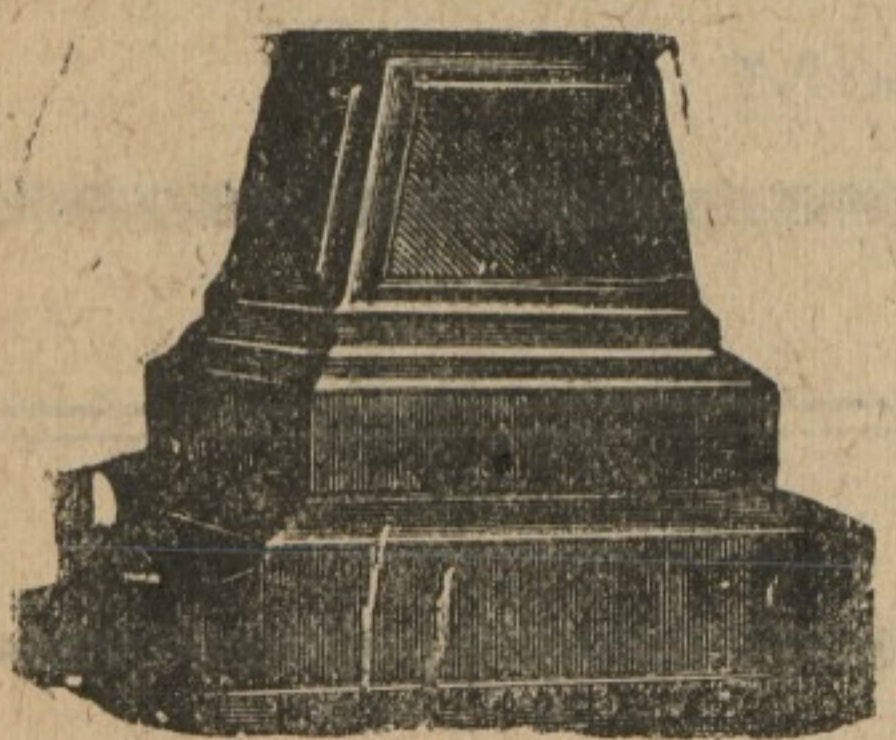

### Entrance Examinations State Scholarships in Engineering Courses

ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS for the School of Engineering, as well as for the Colleges of Arts and Sciences, will be held in the Civil Engineering Building, Homewood, Monday-Saturday, June 20-25, 1921, beginning at 9 a. m. Each day, under the auspices of the College Entrance Examination Board. APPLICATIONS FOR SCHOLARSHIPS IN THE DEPARTMENT OF ENGINEERING, established under the provisions of the Laws of Maryland, Chapter 36, 1912, will now be received. There is more than one applicant for a particular scholarship, a competitive examination must be taken Friday, September 22, 1921, beginning at 9 a. m. Appointments will be made soon thereafter. Each Legislative District of Baltimore City and each county of the State, with the exception of Cecil, Harford, Howard and Queen Anne's, will be entitled to one or more scholarships for the year 1921-1922, in addition to those which have already been assigned. In the four counties mentioned above all the available scholarships have been awarded. Under the provisions of the Act of Assembly, the County and City Scholarships in the School of Engineering are awarded only to deserving students whose financial circumstances are such that they are unable to obtain an education in Engineering unless free tuition is granted to them. The scholarships entitle the holders to free tuition, free use of text-books and exemption from all regular fees. One of the scholarships in each County and in each Legislative District of the City carries also the sum of \$200, and is known as a "Senatorial Scholarship." Senatorial Scholarships may be awarded for 1921-22 in Baltimore City (first, second, third and fourth Districts), Anne Arundel, Baltimore, Calvert, Kent, Montgomery, Prince George's, Somerset and Washington Counties. Scholarships may be awarded to graduates of Loyola College, St. John's College, Washington College, Western Maryland College, Maryland Agricultural College, St. Mary's College, Rock Hill College. Three scholarships may be awarded "At Large." Applicants should address The Registrar, The Johns Hopkins University, for blank forms of application and catalogue giving information, as to examinations, award of scholarships, and courses of instruction. The next session begins Tuesday, October 4, 1921.

The most severe hail storm ever known to visit Kent county on Monday, May 23rd last. It entered Betterton and cut a path varying up to about 6 miles in width through the county and passed on to Chester river at Morgene. In its wake lay fields of nearly matured grain, beaten and cut down as if they had been mowed. Fields of clover, grass and alfalfa, gardens, poultry, window glass and buildings were also destroyed. The loss was heavy where these hail stones fell, while the farms that were not touched were fortunate. Some fellow farmers are in distress. They have not a bushel of wheat to sell, feed or sow for seed. In this day of co-operation and "getting together" among our farmers, is there not any chance for relief? To those whose wheat was not destroyed, think what it would mean if it had been so.

Suppose every farmer in Kent whose wheat was not destroyed would put into a pool one bushel of wheat out of every one hundred bushels he threshes from his present crop and would give it to those farmers who suffered the loss, would it not be appreciated? It would at least furnish seed wheat for those who had none. Details could be worked out later.

This "do unto others as you would have others do unto you" is merely thrown out for the sentiment of those in Kent county who today have fields of standing grain.

One day last week Mrs. Lawrence R. Strong, living in Broad Neck, received a box of day-old chicks from the Queen Anne Poultry Farm and placed them in a large brooder which she had made for the accommodation of the chicks. The next day she went to the brooder and found that every chick but one had disappeared. An investigation was made by Mr. Strong, who found a huge rat in another building, which had taken out all the chicks.

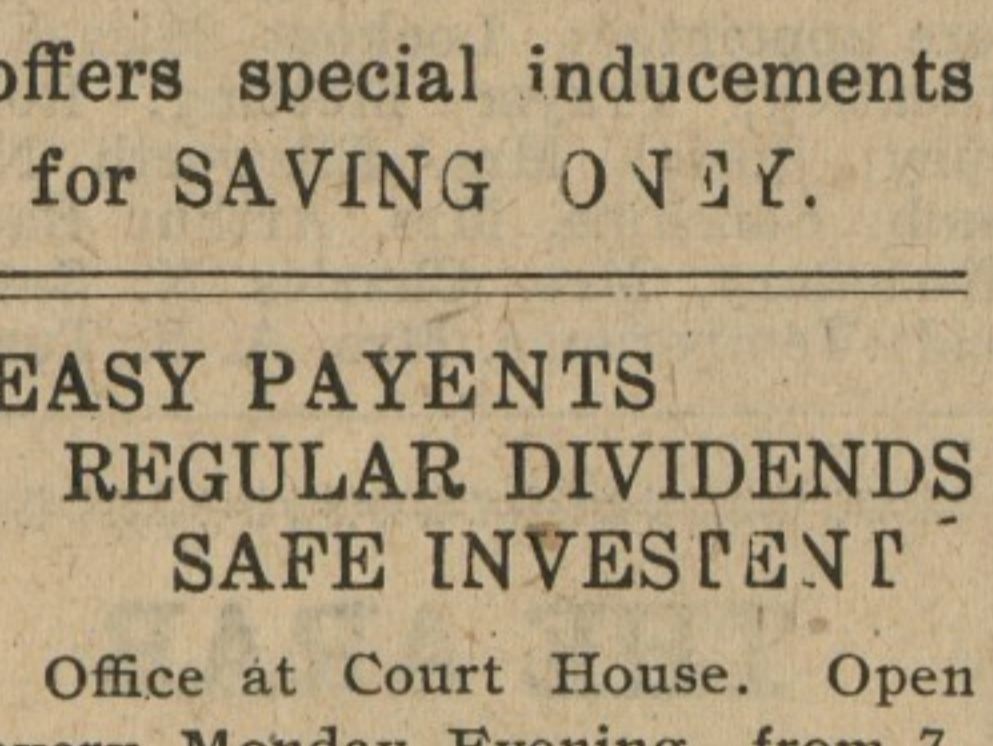
