RIISING SUN VISITED BY \$54,000 BLAZE

Fire Following An Explosion, Wrecks Garage, Dwelling And Church. The explosion of an auto delivery tank owned by the American Gas Company Monday morning, during the filling of an outside underground storage tank belonging to Scott Wilson's Garage, in Rising Sun, Cecil county, caused the biggest fire that town has suffered for many years. The damage totaled \$54,000.

The local firemen asked assistance from Oxford, Pa., Kennett Square, West Grove, Pa., Elkton, Port Deposit, Perry Point, Havre de Grace, Newark and Wilmington, Del., all of which sent fire-fighting apparatus to the town. Oxford and Elkton were the first two companies to respond, and they had the fire well under control when the other companies arrived.

The garage, its owner's residence and Methodist Episcopal Church were destroyed. Another residence owned by Mary Ely was damaged to the extent of \$3000 by fire and water. The stock in the store of Mark Ely & Son was damaged by water to the extent of \$1000.

The destruction of the W. Scott Wilson garage and dwelling entailed a loss of \$25,000; Methodist Episcopal Church was valued at \$25,000. The church, which was of brick construction, had just undergone improvements.

Mrs. Reynolds stated that a big truck was standing in front of Scott Wilson's (Central) garage, loading gasoline. The engine was still running and backfired, which backfire, it is believed, ignited the gasoline and caused the explosion. The first was followed a short time later by a second, when another tank went up.

While the Elkton Fire Company was at Rising Sun a call came from Leeds, Md., for its engine. The home of J. F. Miller on his farm there was burned to the ground.
