HEALTH SITUATION

The Water Board and the Town Commissioners are bending all their energies to solve the health conditions in Chestertown. The fact that Miss Inez Russell, teacher in the lower grades of the Elementary School, Lucile Rasin and A. Parks Rasin, Jr., Frank B. Hines, Jr., J. Thawley and C. F. Parks, Jr., all scholars in this school, have fever is certainly convincing evidence of something being wrong at the school. Officials from the State and county have been here and their findings will be eagerly awaited. This matter of health by means of sanitation and cleanliness is too lightly valued by most people. All over the country there is a movement to organize municipal health departments with the same efficiency considered necessary for school, police and highway work, and to start county movements to promote health ideas in the rural districts.

After your public officials have done everything possible in the way of health regulation, then you must depend on the co-operation of the people. Where there are many families that live in a careless way, it takes a lot of propaganda to remove disease perils. No matter what precautions you take, if you have people who spit in the public streets, who take no pains to keep garbage and manure covered who permit flies to swarm unchecked in their dirty homes, you have a disease peril always existing that no amount of public health efficiency can offset.

Splendid work is being done in many localities to promote health information and ideas among the common people. In Morgan county, Ala., for instance, they have newspaper articles prepared once a week by the county health officer, lectures on health subjects with lantern slides, health posters in public places, exhibits at the county fair showing how disease germs are carried and a physical inspection of every school child in the county.

The schools are the most promising of all these lines of effort. If you teach health and sanitation principles to young folks at an age when they take in new ideas easily, they will not forget them.
