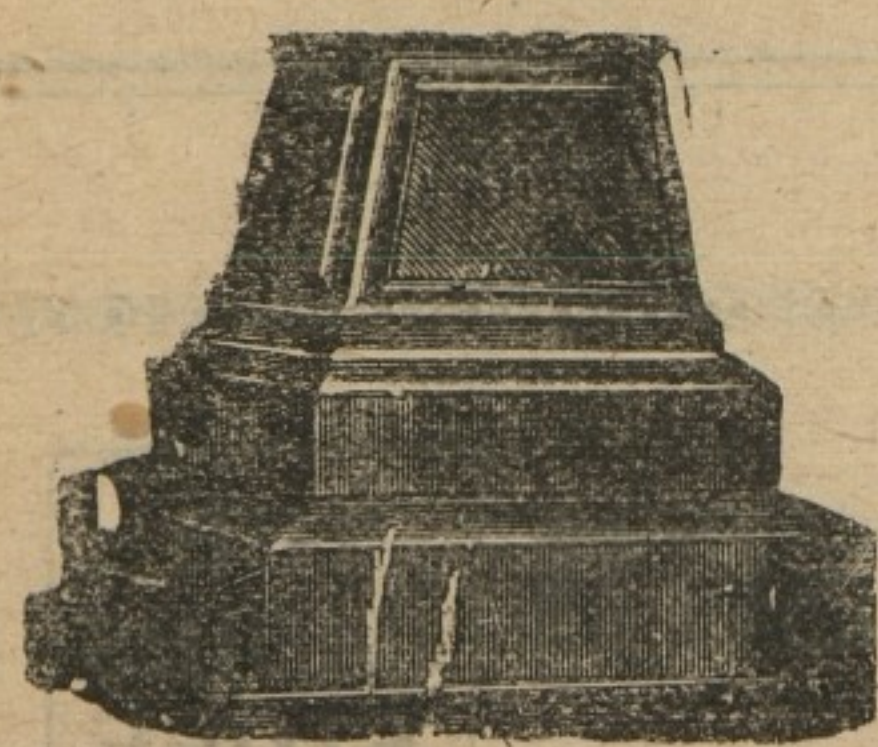

Bella Pontiac, the world's record cow, owned by T. A. Barron, of Brantford, Ont., has set a new record. Figures made public last Thursday by James Wilson, supervisor of the official test of the Holstein-Friesian Association, showed that for the fiscal year ended June 18th Bella Pontiac produced: Milk, 27,017 pounds; fat, 1,259 pounds, and butter, 1573.75 pounds. 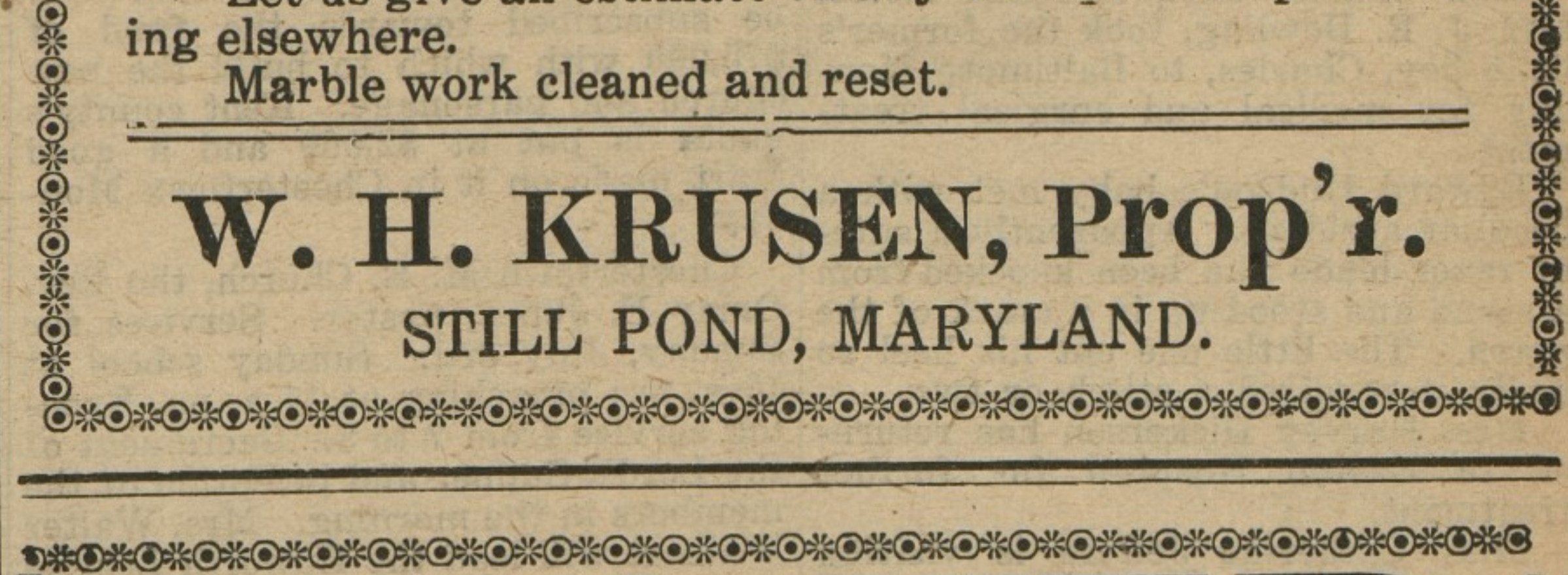
