JAS. P. BROWN HEADS CHURCH HILL BANK

At a regular weekly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Church Hill Bank of Maryland, Thursday, James P. Brown, of "Ripley," near Church Hill, was unanimously elected President of the institution, to succeed the late Edwin S. Valliant. At the same time Enoch G. Coppage was elected Vice-President.

The new bank president is a son of James Brown and the late Mary S. Brown, of Ripley, near Church Hill. He was born February 24, 1873, and resides on the same farm where he was born.

After receiving his early education in the public schools of Queen Anne's county, Mr. Brown was a student at Washington College, Chestertown, and Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore. For twelve years he was engaged in business in Baltimore. For several years he was associated with the Roland Park Company, and later was connected with the Evening News Publishing Company in Baltimore.

Fifteen years ago he returned to Queen Anne's county and since that time has been engaged in farming. Ten years ago he was elected a Director of the Church Hill Bank of Maryland and during the time he has been associated with the institution has forcibly demonstrated his ability as an excellent business man. In 1915 he became Vice-President to succeed the late J. K. Brown. He is a director of the Kent Mutual Fire Insurance Company and is registrar of the Board of Vestry of St. Luke's Church.

TWO STATES AGREE TO HELP SAVE CRAB INDUSTRY

Kent counties who have been interested in saving the crab industry, and who have recognized for the last several years that unless action was taken to establish uniform laws of the States of Maryland and Virginia, the Chesapeake Bay crab soon would be extinct, are pleased to learn of the successful results obtained at a meeting on Washington on Wednesday. At that time officials of Maryland and Virginia conferred with Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover, who acted as arbitrator in the case.

It was decided that uniform laws should be passed, by the passage of laws in the Virginia legislature to conform with laws already enacted by the Maryland General Assembly. Chairman Harrison W. Vickers, of the Conservation Commission of Maryland, and Sverpston Earle, of Queen Anne's county, one of the consulting engineers, were present at the meeting in Washington and were instrumental in calling the meeting.

Capt. John C. Reed, who until about five years ago ran the steamer the Land Mills from Baltimore to Centreville Landing, was killed at Griffin's Garage, Mount Washington, Baltimore recently by a negro by the name of Hamilton Green. The negro was arrested and confessed that he killed the captain, but claimed he did it in self defense.

Capt. Reed was about fifty-eight years of age, and will be remembered as a quiet, affable and straightforward business man. The negro has not so far had a court trial.

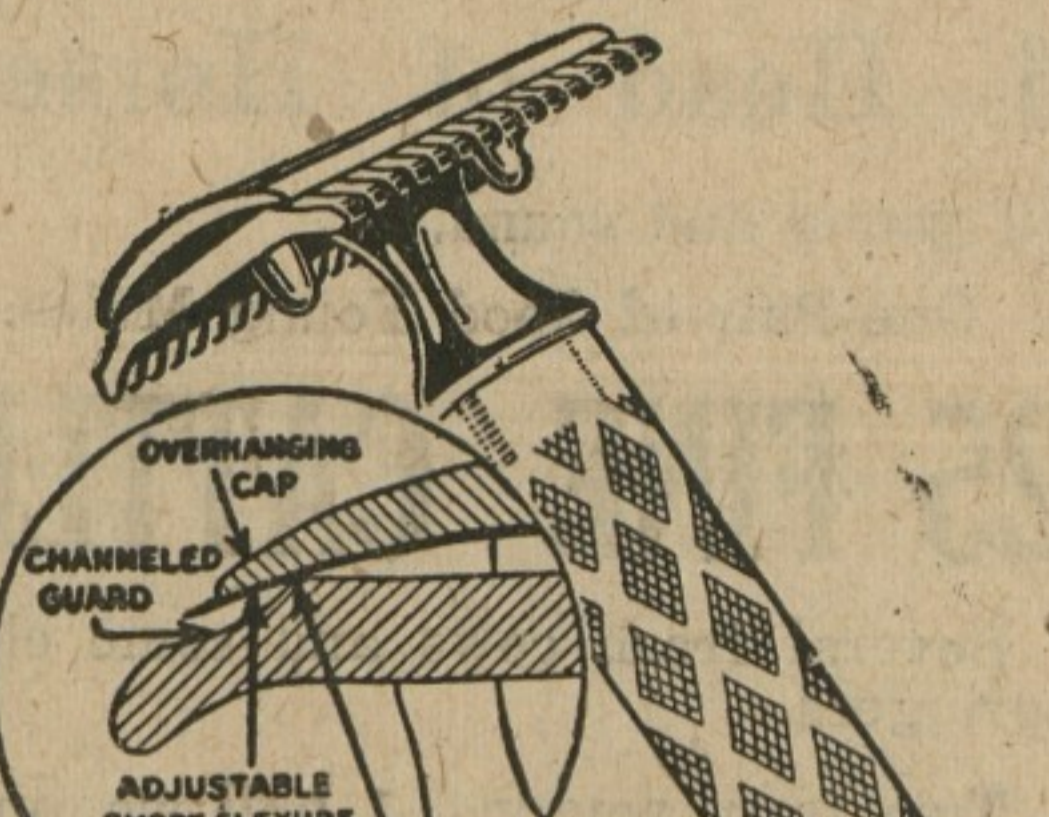
