Important Notice To Owners Of U. S. Liberty Loan Bonds.

We have been advised by the United States Treasury Department that on March 31, 1921, thousands of owners of Liberty Bonds had failed to cash coupons due at various times prior to that date, as a result of which interest amounting to \$83,165,867.35 and belonging to owners of these securities is still in the hands of the Treasury Department instead of in the possession of those owning coupons which were due but not presented for payment up to that date.

We presume that failure to collect this interest is an oversight or due to lack of information in not presenting the coupons at the time they were due, but more probably to the failure to present temporary bonds, on which all coupons should have been cashed, in exchange for new bonds with full sets of coupons running to maturity.

Bonds that have been left in the various banks for safe keeping we presume have been attended to. So this notice is only intended for the individual holder.

LOCAL NOTES

The excursions to Chestertown are proving quite popular. Sunday the B. S. Ford left Baltimore with 525 and returned with 688. Rock Hall ferry was out of commission and passengers to Baltimore went via Ford.

In the News last week were advertised public sale 144 horses and mules and 292 cows. The same period last year was advertised 175 horses and 250 cows.

Edward Crew, a farmer of near Crumpton, lost a valuable horse last week by getting its foot caught in wire. The foot was found on the fence and the horse in the middle of the field.

J. W. Hinson has been granted permission by the Public Service Commission to establish a passenger route from Centerville to Rock Hall Ferry via Chestertown. He put two large cars on the route Wednesday and expects to run regularly. The fare from Chestertown to Ferry is 75 cents.

On Tuesday testimony was taken in the case of R. Hynson Rogers, wife et al against J. Ford Dorrance, and the trial continued. Mr. Dorrance last year purchased the Coleman farm on Fairlee Creek from Mr. Rogers but failed it is claimed to comply with the terms. Mr. Rogers has brought suit. A large sum is involved.

P. M. Brooks, the energetic proprietor of Radcliffe Mills, sent a carload of his famous Rose Bud Flour to Europe this week. This 50,000 pounds of flour will probably go to France. Thus the name of "Rosebud" will become famous in the country which was torn by war.

The great fair at Cambridge will be held next week. Special attractions besides good racing are promised. See adv. in another column.

W. S. Carroll has a beautiful crepe myrtle bush now in full bloom at his home on Water street.

Fire destroyed the barns on Rock Point farm, Worton Point, belonging to James G. Harris, last week origin unknown. These buildings were insured by Joseph N. Wheatley & Co. Personalty in the barns owned by Mr. McCleary, was insured by James G. Beck.

Mrs. W. L. Wilkins, of near Rock Hall, is only an amateur chicken raiser but some of the professionals are watching her. She has a white Wyandotte hen that began to lay eggs when four months and twenty days old. She hatched out 350 chickens and all lived but ten. Out of 75 Pecon ducks she has raised 71. Who can beat these records?

The Public Utilities Commission of the District of Columbia in consideration of the Telephone Company's present schedule of rates, which expired on August 1, 1921, have ruled that the present rates are to remain in effect for an extended period of seven months.

It is understood that the postoffice department proposes to discontinue the motor truck route between Hurlock and Church Hill the last of this month and there is talk of important changes in the present star route motor truck line between Easton, Chestertown and Elkton.

Brooks' mill will exchange 196 lbs. "Rosebud" flour and 45 lbs. bran for 5 bushels and 36 pounds of wheat. Wheat growers should do a little figuring and save money on their flour bills.

The State officers and board of the Daughters of America consisting of eight ladies, will visit Chestertown Council No. 58, on Monday evening next. A large attendance is requested.

All persons in the county interested in Red Cross Work are asked to read the editorial in Country Gentleman of July 16th, and in the August number of the Ladies' Home Journal, an editorial and an article on "conservation Gardens."

Bids for the construction of a new hard-surface road between Centerville and Carville, were opened and contract awarded the Kaufman Construction Company on their bid of \$28,777. The new road will be one mile long and will be another connecting link in the contemplated chain of improved highways extending from the Centerville-Church Hill road toward Ingleside.

The United States Civil Service Commission has called an examination for August 13, in Chestertown, to fill the vacancy in the postmastership at Betterton. The term of the present postmistress, Mrs. Charles H. Brice, expired on January 5. This office was made a presidential office, during the term of the present postmistress, who was reappointed, but failed of confirmation by the Senate, along with a thousand or more other postmasters appointed by President Wilson. The office pays \$1,400 per annum, and it is said there will be a large number of applicants.

Last year potatoes sold for \$12 a barrel and some growers held them for \$15. But the slump came and thousands of barrels were left to rot for the growers. This year with the season opening around \$2.25 to \$2.50 per barrel the situation appeared hopeless for the growers, but those who did not sell at first have seen their price crawl up to \$3.50 a barrel. This is a small price in contrast to last year's, but the expenses of marketing are not near as high as last year.

According to reports there is a shortage of potatoes throughout the country. Next week will see most of the spring crop cleaned up.

Among the wonderful performers of the recent past Wilmer Hoopes, of Hartford, reports that his cow, Victor's Silvia L., showed the following to her credit in the month of April last—76 pounds of butter fat and 1734.5 pounds of milk, her highest yield of milk for a single day being 62.5 pounds. For the month of May she produced 66 pounds and for June 65 pounds.

The Atlantic City excursion Thursday carried over 600. Chestertown furnished 50 white and 213 colored while Centerville had 133. Within \$1 of a thousand dollars was taken in here. All report a fine trip.

Dr. Edward A. Clarke, who recently purchased the Breckwood property on Chester river from Charles Reiche, for \$14,000, has moved his family there from Pennsylvania.

Harvey W. Morris has resigned as manager of the R. J. Dunn stock farm in Quaker Neck, and will engage in other employment.

In a collision near the Chestertown milk station, Saturday morning, H. Clay Lusby, a farmer living near town was thrown from a buggy and painfully injured. No bones were broken, but he sustained a number of bruises and has been in bed for several days. His vehicle was struck by an auto.
