

FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY

Sunday, July 24th, was "Epochal" in the history and life of Westminster Presbyterian Church, Georgetown, Md. The church has rounded out 50 years of life and work. The event was used to celebrate not only the 50 years of Westminster's history, but the 184 (or more) years since its predecessor—the Old Brick Church—was organized. The day with bright skies and balmy air, was all that could be desired. The attendance—both morning and afternoon, was large and gathered from many quarters. They were there from Baltimore, Philadelphia, Wilmington, Chesapeake City, Middletown, Chestertown, Millington, Cecilton and many other sections. After the "historical discourse" in the morning, the disciples of Jesus Christ present enjoyed a precious season of communion in the Lord's Supper. More than 100 communed. At this service four new members were received into our fellowship; and a baby (great-grandchild of one of our oldest members) received the rite of baptism. As the close of the morning service, an hour and a half was given to the "basket lunch" and to social intercourse. Old friends, many of whom had not met each other in years, rejoiced in renewing the ties of friendship. New friends were made, and seemed happy in the social hour of fellowship.

At the afternoon session the gathering filled the house. Rev. E. W. Gaylord, first pastor, 1873-89, was at his best, and gave us an address replete with pearls and golden nuggets. Out of the fullness of his heart, and of his ripe experience, he brought us face to face with the true mission of the church—"What the church stands for and what we owe to the church." Messages from Rev. Dr. Robinson, of Bethlehem, Pa.; and Rev. Dr. Stone, of Belvedere, N. J.; and Rev. K. M. Bull, of Kennett Square, Pa., and Rev. Wm. Clews, of Washington, D. C., were read. These brethren were at one time or another ministers to Westminster. Rev. John Townley, pastor of "Forest" Church, Middletown, Del., a church that gave to Westminster some of its staunch members in the organization of the church, as well as at later times—brought warm, earnest greetings. Rev. H. C. Collins, rector of Shrewsbury Parish Church, a church that dates from 1692, brought us a most inspiring message. He led us out from all thought of "Denominationalism" into the higher thought, the broader, richer, truer thought of the "Church of the Blood-bought." It made us feel to say in our hearts: "Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!" [Ps. 133].

Rev. J. P. Wooden, pastor of Kennebecville M. P. Church, brought to us the felicitations of that church in his genial and happy manner of putting apt thoughts in appropriate language. The singing of the several hymns, led by the "Union" chorus choir was hearty and inspiring. The several quartettes and duets were rendered in an admirable manner, and added materially to the worshipful spirit of the day. Altogether, the day was one long to be remembered and gives promise of rich things for the future of Westminster Church and for the community to which it seeks to minister. 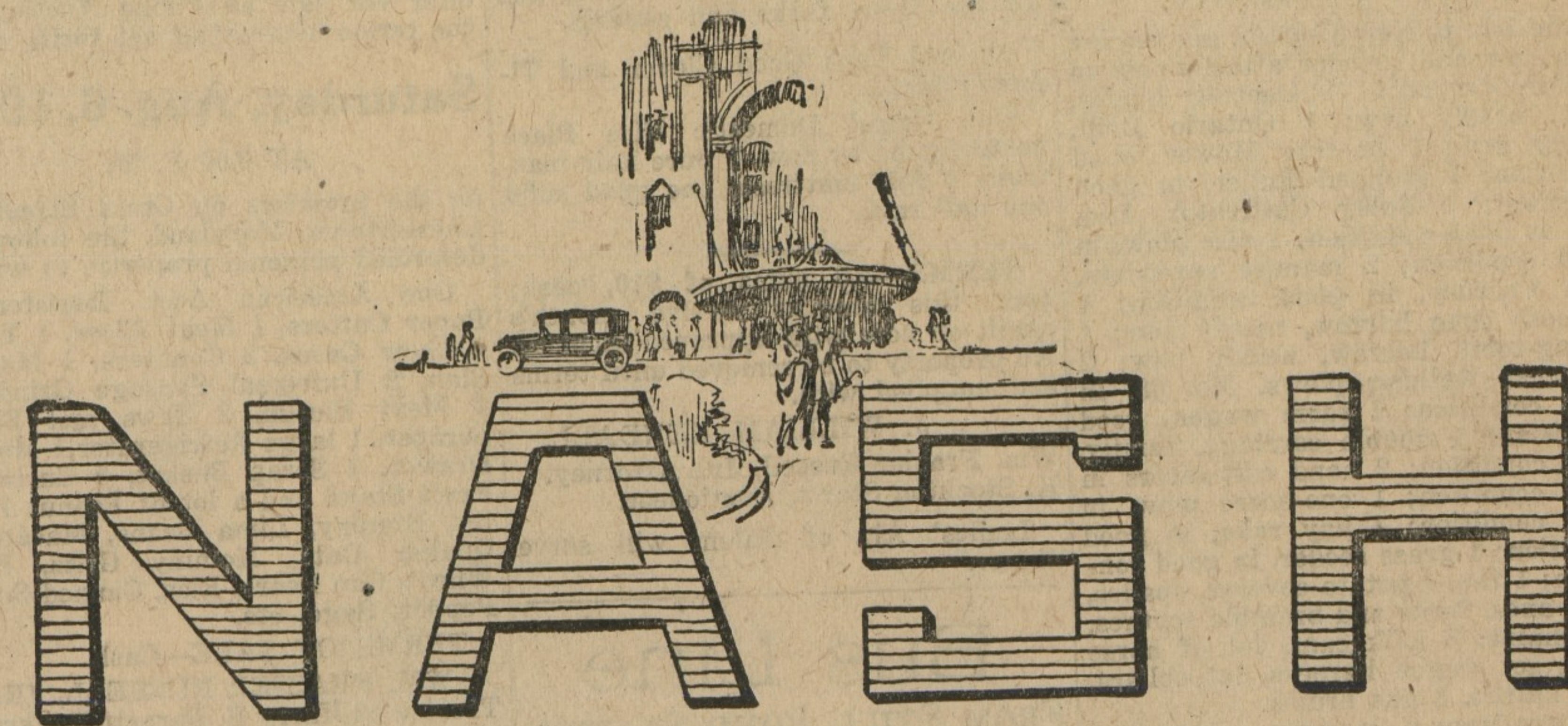
