SOME IMPORTANT ISSUES

The News is certainly glad to be able to present to the public some real live issues for the political campaign that is about to begin in this county and State.

Some plan of re-organization of the various State Departments, must be worked out, in order that greater efficiency may result and at the same time a material reduction in the cost of State government be effected.

Another issue and one of great importance from an economy standpoint is that of fewer elections. There is no reason why the public should not be relieved of this burden and we sincerely hope that Gov. Ritchie's Reorganization Committee will work out a plan to this end.

The News joins with the Wisconsin County News in suggesting the appointment of a woman on the School Board.

Assisting in the administration of our public schools is right in the province of a woman. When it comes to matters pertaining to the welfare of children in the school and in helping to solve countless other details and problems, her advice and help would prove invaluable.

The average father, deeply engrossed in his business affairs or with his farm work, usually leaves the school problems for the mother to take care of. As a rule he knows very little about the many little details of school life and the functioning of a school that seldom ever escapes the watchful eye of the mother.

By all means let us have a woman on the Board of Education in Kent County. It will be giving to the mothers of the county what is justly due them, and we are confident that the appointment of a woman on the board will be readily justified by the excellence of her administrative work.

The Democratic Convention should pledge itself to the passage of a Prohibition Enforcement bill, and the Democratic members of the Legislature should give their untiring efforts to the passage of such a bill as will make Prohibition in Maryland an actuality instead of a farce.

The Democratic State Convention and the Democratic forces in the Legislature must put Sunday back on the map, says the Crisisfield Times. The legalized desecration of the Sabbath which now exists is a disgrace to any civilized citizenship, and must not be longer tolerated.

Two Full Democratic Lists In Queen Anne's.

Queen Anne's county Democratic voters are confronted by two practically complete county tickets from which to select nominees in the Democratic primaries on Friday, September 9.

Neither faction has endorsed a candidate for Sheriff, and it was understood that neither faction plans was to take any definite action in this regard. For several weeks it has been generally accepted theory that the Harrison-Roe combination would support the candidacy of former Sheriff Sanford E. Spry, but this has now been confirmed.

Confirming the action of the people of their own district, who previously had met and agreed upon candidates believed to be generally satisfactory in an economical and efficient interest of the county's affairs, fully 200 Democrats gathered in Centerville the early part of the week and participated in a meeting which unanimously endorsed a ticket to be presented in the Democratic primaries.

Organization Ticket Announced. The ticket is composed of the following: County Commissioners.

R. H. Linwood Carter, Third district; J. Fred Carter, Fourth district; and Noble L. Coppage, Second district.

Delegates To Legislature. Charles E. Shaw, of the Fifth district; Gurney Knotts, of the First district.

State Central Committee. William R. Wilson, of the First district; John W. Perry, of the Third district; and T. Roland Carville, of the Fourth district.

Delegates To State Convention. W. Irving Walker, Second district; J. Edward Stevens, of the Third district; and James U. Quinby, of the Third district.

Harrison-Roe Ticket Named. While the politicians identified with the Harrison-Roe faction were frequent visitors in Centerville during the early part of the week, it was not until Thursday that a portion of their ticket was definitely announced.

In their County Commissioner ticket however, only one of the original members for this office remained in the definite line-up. Charles E. Bishop, of the Fifth district, has been the pivot about which their County Commissioner ticket has been formed, and at the meeting held his running

mates were announced as follows: A. Sudler Baxter, of the Seventh district; and Oliver C. Newman, of the Second district. William R. Coleman, of the Seventh district, had been mentioned for several weeks as the likely man on the County Commissioner ticket, but in the final analysis he was transferred to the State Central Committee and the name of A. Sudler Baxter substituted in his stead.

The Harrison-Roe ticket is therefore as follows: County Commissioners.

Oliver C. Newman, Second district; A. Sudler Baxter, Seventh district; Charles E. Bishop, Fifth district.

Delegates To Legislature. The women on this ticket are Mrs. Charles W. Butler, of the Fifth district; Medford Roe, of the First district.

State Central Committee. William R. Coleman, Seventh district; A. Howard Johnson, of the Third district; J. Milton Hunter, of the Sixth district.

The women on this ticket are Mrs. J. S. Muir, of the Third district; Mrs. James Merrick, of the First district; and Mrs. Stephen E. Gillespie, of the Fourth district.

The Republicans completed their local ticket late Friday evening by the entrance of G. W. Owens & Son, Guy, as candidates for Legislature. It is reported that G. W. Owens will likely withdraw and a candidate from Millington put in his place. An effort was made to get a lady but no one could be induced to try it.

There are only three places on the Democratic ticket for which there are contests. For treasurer, the candidates are Leonard Wilson, of Millington, and Adam Start, of Broad Neck; for register of wills, S. G. Caldwell, of Galena, and Harvey Moore, of Belterton; for sheriff Thomas Hadaway, Wm. Goodman, John Burris, Emory Crouch. Primary, September 9th.
