"Sheila," that young man answered with satisfaction, "has agreed to have me about for the rest of her natural life. That, of course, includes you, Aunt Worthy."

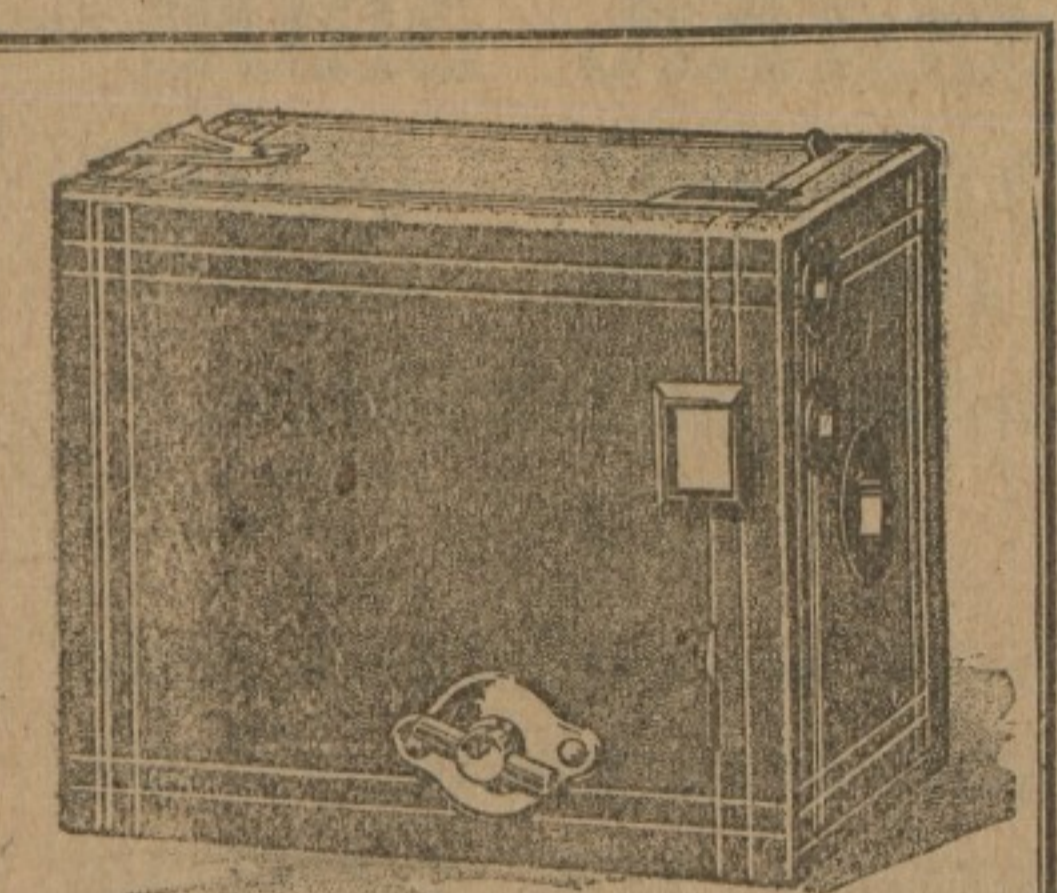

State of Maryland Department of Health Maryland Plumbing Code

Passed March 17, 1921. MARYLAND STATE BOARD OF HEALTH In Conformity With Chapter 675 of the Acts of 1914

CONNECTION TO PUBLIC SEWER REQUIRED—CESSPOOLS AND PRIVIES TO BE ABANDONED

Whenever there exists a sewer under public ownership in any street or alley, owners of all houses on properties, abutting on such street or alley shall install adequate plumbing systems as hereinafter provided for, and shall connect the same with said sewer wherever topographically possible; provided that no house more than 500 feet from the sewer shall be required to connect with it, unless the State Board of Health shall deem such connection necessary. No cesspools, privies or other means of private sewage disposal shall be permitted wherever a sewer under public ownership adjoins the premises in question, and each and every existing cesspool or privy shall be eliminated or left in a condition satisfactory to the State Board of Health.

FIXTURES REQUIRED

Whenever a building is connected with a public or private sewer there shall be installed in said building or on the premises not less than one water-closet and one sink or wash basin, both of which shall be properly connected as herein provided with said public or private sewer. In case the water-closet is not within the building such water-closet shall be of the frost-proof type. All new residences shall have, in addition, at least one bath. INDEPENDENT SEWER CONNECTION FOR EACH BUILDING The plumbing or drainage system of every building shall be entirely separate from and independent from that of any other building, and separate properties shall, wherever practicable, have independent connection with a public or private sewer; provided that more than one property may connect with said sewer by one connection if the pipes leading from the separate properties join each other on public property.
