**SEES GOOD OYSTER YIELD**

Back from an inspection trip, Harrison W. Vickers, chairman of the State Conservation Commission, says that prospects for oysters this season are good, in spite of the mussels which are plentiful in some sections. The oyster industry is, however, quiet at this time, Mr. Vickers finds, a condition attributed to the warm weather. The Conservation Commission believes that September should be eliminated from the oyster calendar and legislation to this effect may be introduced at the coming session of the Legislature.

While visiting his sweetheart, they decided to slip over to Chestertown and get married and the plan was carried out. Mrs. Simmons, who is a du Pont Company employe, continued at her duties when she returned, but this week something she said to friends caused them to suspect what had happened and there was a general confession and congratulations were showered upon the couple.

**BURGLARS INVADE APARTMENTS OF COUNTY JAILS**

The apartment of four county girls, who reside at 1432 R street, N. W., Washington, D. C., was burglarized Tuesday while they were at their places of employment. The girls, Misses Elizabeth Roe and Susie Sparks, of Sudlersville; Bertha Wilson, of Ingleside, and Estelle Anthony, of Chestertown. The young women had left home before nine o'clock for their respective positions, and when Miss Roe returned home shortly after 4 p. m., she found the door open and trunks, closets and bureau drawers ransacked. The robbers had broken the lock on one trunk, and although a small amount of money had been taken, number of liberty bonds had been overlooked. Another trunk that contained money had been overlooked, but practically all of the jewelry belonging to the ladies was stolen. Although the police and a detective are working on the case, no arrests have yet been made.

**Girls' Clubs Show Progress.**

Ten Girls' Clubs met last week with a large attendance. The girls showed a marked improvement over last year, in the ease of manner with which they conducted their meetings. A large part of the time now is being spent in finishing up the year's work in a creditable manner in order that they may receive a certificate of award for completed work. Fully three-fourths of the members have finished the year's work and are making plans for next year's work. A great many girls are getting into sewing, poultry and canned goods ready for the County Exhibit. The forty-four girls who attended the County Comp at Washington College and the nine girls who attended girls' and boys' club week at College Park are distinguishing themselves as leaders in the club work. Some girls have come back with the desire to start work in dress making, others want to make their own hats, and still others want to conduct a winter demonstration in sewing laying hens. Girls who have made considerable money out of poultry this year are planning to rearrange their bedrooms and make them attractive. The clubs that do best work will start work at the hot school lunch.

At the next club meetings which will be held from October 17th to October 21st, inclusive, the girls will be given a demonstration in patching and darning. A part of the time will be spent in giving instructions on keeping the poultry record, and in writing the story of the year's work.

Best single box of Delicious, Grimes, Jonathan, King David, Nero, Paragon, Rome, Stayman, Stark, Winesap, York Imperial, first \$50, second \$3, third \$2. Best hamper, first \$3, second \$2. For the best ten hampers, first \$10, second \$5. For the best three barrel collection, first \$20, second \$15, third \$5. For the best barrel of the following varieties, first \$5, second \$3: Ben Davis, Grimes, Jonathan, King David, Lankford, Paragon, Rome, Stark, Stayman, Winesap, York Imperial. Best five plates of each of the following varieties: first, \$10; second \$5; third, \$3; Delicious, Paragon, Stayman Winesap. Prizes will also be offered for plates of a large number of varieties.

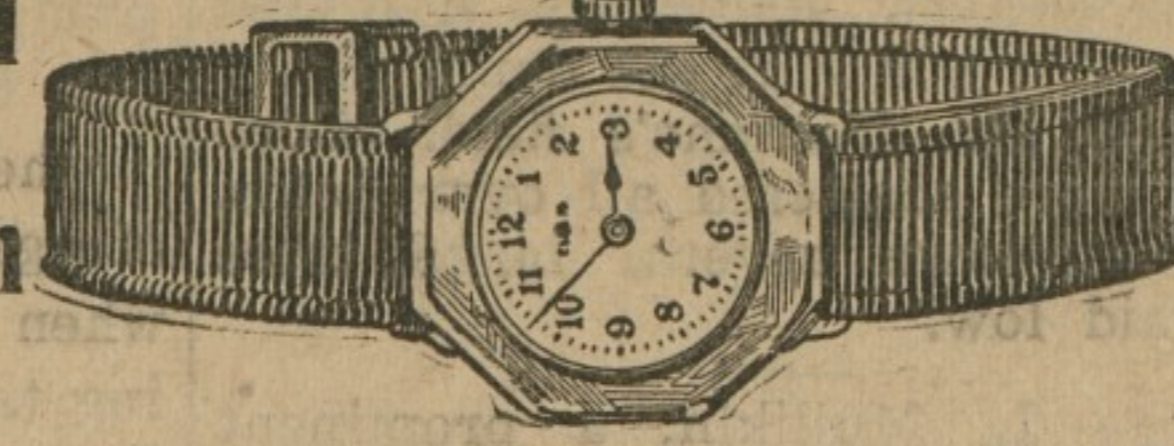
