A SERIOUS SITUATION

The Democratic party has put in the field this year a ticket composed of strong, representative, and able men. Nominated by the voters of the party under the direct primary, it should certainly be elected. Were it not for the colored vote, which casts its ballots automatically for the Republican ticket, there would be no doubt as to how the election would go. Analyzing the vote of this county is not a very pleasant undertaking, but if each citizen should do that he or she would find that when a Republican is elected to public office, he represents and is responsible to, but 15 per cent of the white population. This dictation by a minority, who are in the political game for money only and who hold their power through their ability to control the negro vote, is an astounding thing; and it is a hopeless thing from the standpoint of civic betterment and good government. What can you expect from an official who is responsible to only 15 per cent of the public? Is he going to be honest and by the public for the public good, or by the bosses among the 15 per cent who made him?

The negro today is as much a chattel politically as he ever was. The cold-blooded hypocrisy with which he has been treated by the Republican politicians is notorious, for such gentility have never tried to uplift him or help him, but instead have done their utmost to keep in political serfdom so that he could be used by them for their own selfish purposes. But the educated negro, who today has risen despite the efforts made to keep him down, is demanding a new deal. He is demanding representation in the councils of his party, and what is more, in some parts of the State of Maryland he is getting it. This year in some of the counties of the State and in Baltimore city negroes are running on the Republican ticket against white men. The Republican politician is being forced to admit the equality that he has preached for years and never practiced. It naturally follows that if the Republican party ever gets in power again in Maryland the negro is going to demand this same equality, and that it be applied to schools as it exists in Pennsylvania. This is something for the white women of the county to think about.

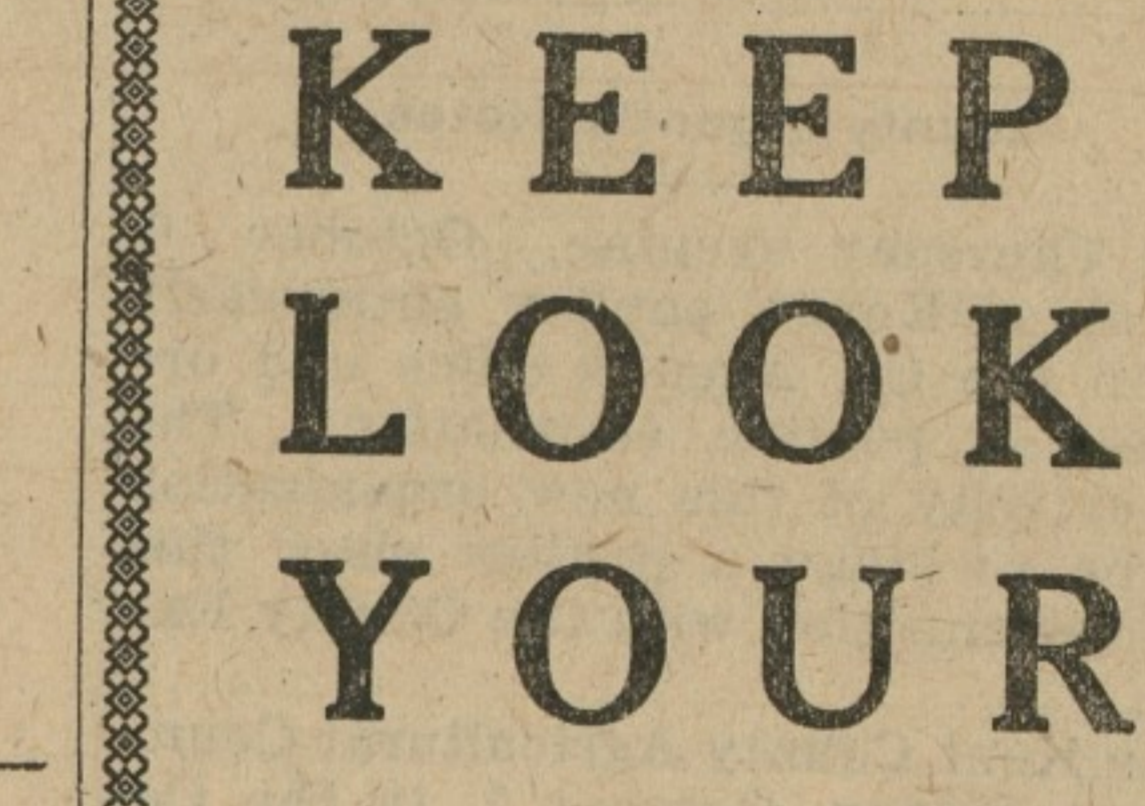
