An innovation to the business life of the Eastern Shore in the form of a corporation, having for its purpose the purchase and marketing of poultry and eggs, is to be introduced within the next few weeks in one of the lower counties. Wisconsin, it is understood, may be chosen. H. W. Rickey, of the State Extension Service, University of Maryland, who is now on a three months' leave of absence, is planning to start the concern. Mr. Rickey has had 17 years' experience in the poultry work and nine years in educational lines. Such an organization as planned will furnish an outlet for all egg production in Wisconsin county, besides drawing largely from Somerset, Talbot, Worcester, Dorchester and Caroline, the Eastern Shore of Virginia and lower Delaware.

John F. and Ella E. Coburn, of near Rock Hall, through their solicitor, T. Herbert Skipper, have applied for the benefit of their estate.

The potato crop here, notwithstanding the long drought, is the largest in many years, and the prices are excellent. One grower harvested 600 baskets of select potatoes from a small garden patch.

Chicken thieving has become prevalent in this section and poultrymen are losing large numbers of their chickens. One farmer's wife was relieved of 100 chickens at one visit, and upon another visit she lost 30. The officers of the law are keeping a close watch for the thieves.
